When to see a GP

The GP can see all aspects of care that the Advanced Nurse practitioner can see but in addition:

- Follow Up Appointments
- Illnesses which don't improve after first course of treatment
- Sick Notes
- Referrals
- Screening patients for disease risk factors or early signs of illness

When to see an Advanced Nurse Practitioner

- Wounds, scalds, burns or rashes
- Acute back pain/joint sprains
- Shingles
- Oral thrush
- Acute chest infection
- Dizziness, headaches
- Conjunctivitis, sticky discharge eye, sty
- Diarrhoea, constipation, piles
- Vomiting
- Urinary tract infections
- Cystitis
- Vaginal thrush soreness, lump or discharge
- Tonsillitis
- Earache
- Cough
- Flu like illnesses
- Sore throat
- Raised temperature
- Long-term conditions - asthma, eczema, high blood pressure, coronary heart disease, raised cholesterol levels, diabetes, epilepsy and respiratory disease.
